



Alan Flattmann 1946-2025

Alan Flattmann has been a fixture in the New Orleans art scene since studying at the John McCrady School of Art located in the world-renowned French Quarter from 1964-1967. His love for the life and scenes of New Orleans led him to become known for paintings of this area, as well as images garnered from his travels around the world. Mr. Flattmann painted in several media, including oils and watercolor, but was recognized

at the highest level for his works in pastel. He was a driving force in encouraging the art world to look at pastels as a medium equal to oils and not just a device for quick sketches and preliminary works. During his professional life, Alan became active in promoting pastel and accomplished much of this through being a founding member of the Degas Pastel Society in 1984 and president for 26 years. The Society, with the Pastel Society of America out of New York, was one of the first pastel societies in the country. The Degas Pastel Society operated out of New Orleans, but its membership was open to pastelists in the U.S. as well as abroad. Currently, DPS has 140 members and has representation from as far away as France and Hong Kong. The Degas Pastel Society became a member of the International Association of Pastel Societies to lend its voice to support the worldwide pastel movement.

Alan's career included painting his beloved New Orleans as well as the rural south. Mr. Flattmann was commissioned to produce work from trips to Egypt and Isreal early in his career. His travels never stopped as he painted scenes from Barbados and Greece to Scotland and China. Known for his landscapes, Alan also greatly enjoyed painting the people of the regions he visited. Many of these works have been featured in many books and magazine articles throughout the years including the Pastel Journal, the Best of America Pastel Artists, Best of Worldwide Artists, An Artists Vision

of New Orleans: The Paintings of Alan Flattmann, and The Contemporary Louisiana Landscape.

For his stunning portrait and landscape works, Mr. Flattmann was honored with many prestigious Best in Show awards. This culminated with him being recognized as a Pastel Society of America Hall of Fame inductee, an International Association of Pastel Societies Eminent Pastelist, as well as garnering a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Degas Pastel Society.

Mr. Flattmann was as much a teacher and mentor as a world-class artist. In 1987 Alan published The Art of Pastel Painting, which continues to be one of the best resources for pastel painters of all levels. He also has three additional books featuring his artwork. Alan taught workshops in the U.S. and abroad allowing generations of studentstobenefit from his vast knowledge of pastel. Indeed, many of his students have gone on to have their own award-winning careers thanks to his mentorship.

Alan was the consummate gentleman, extraordinary mentor and a tireless promoter of pastel. It wasan honor to know and study with him. Alan will be sorely missed by the arts community and our hearts go out to his family for their loss.

Earthberry Pastels: A Review

To review this product, I used two 6-piece sets (Morning Fog and Rustic Landscape) to create a small painting on UArt 400 paper. Since this limited palette contained only two greens (both cool) and a smaller value range than I needed, I augmented my palette with a few NuPastels and Terry Ludwigs.





Upon opening the boxes, I was immediately struck by how beautiful the packaging is. The pastels arrived in recycled cardboard boxes with fibrous, coconut shell material for protection. Having made the trip from Russia with no breakage; the coconut shell material did its job. Inside each box were six luscious pastels along with a color guide adorned with botanical illustrations and the color name and product number of each pastel.

The color guide also contained an indication of the lightfastness rating of each color and whether a particular color was a "chameleon" (more on that later). On the back of the color guide was a blank chart for making color swatches for each pastel. I recommend taking the time to do this since I found that some of the pastels don't go on as light or as dark as they appear in the box.

The rectangular sticks themselves are substantial in the hand, neither too slender nor overly bulky. They have good, sharp edges which are perfect for indicating grasses or making a hard edge.

With respect to texture, I found that Earthberry Pastels occupies a middle ground somewhere between buttery softness and structural firmness. For example, they are softer than Holbeins and Rembrandts, but firmer than Terry Ludwigs, Blue Earth, and Senneliers. I liked the way they handled. They glided across the UArt 400 paper smoothly and consistently, with just the slightest scratchy feel (which I enjoyed). I found them to be well-suited to layering, allowing for both blending as well as bold strokes.

As I mentioned earlier, some (not all) of these pastels are classified by Earthberry as "chameleon". They are so named because rubbing them will cause a slight change, either in color or value. This is an interesting feature and one I plan to explore more fully in the future. If you intend to use the chameleon pastels, I recommend making a color chart with two columns - one for the unblended color and next to it the blended color.

Conclusions

Though I only had twelve Earthberry pastels to work with, I thoroughly enjoyed my painting experience with them. From a price standpoint, they compare favorably to other well-known brands. And I do love Earthberry's commitment to eco-friendly packaging and the use of non-toxic pigments.
